Subject: Seeking Public Comments on the Planned DeLa Express Project

Dear Community Leader:

We are contacting you because the planned DeLa Express Project may impact your community and we want to hear from you. Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) staff recently opened a public comment period and announced the dates, locations, and times for in-person public commenting opportunities (also referred to as scoping sessions). These scoping sessions are opportunities for you and your neighbors to share your thoughts and concerns about this project. Please note that this project has not been approved or authorized. At this time, FERC staff is seeking public input to assist in its environmental review of the project. A courtesy copy of FERC's scoping notice is included with this letter.

### The DeLa Express Project

In filings to FERC, DeLa Express has described that the project is designed to transport natural gas from the Permian Basin in West Texas to markets in and around Lake Charles, Louisiana. DeLa Express plans to construct over 700 miles of interstate natural gas transmission pipeline and associated facilities, including six new compressor stations, across 27 Texas counties and one Louisiana parish.

### Why You Are Receiving This Letter

We have identified your organization as a leader and/or trusted resource in your community and it is our hope that you will help us increase awareness of this public participation opportunity. As a community leader, we believe your involvement in the review process is crucial to ensuring that your community's voices and concerns are heard. It is also important for FERC staff and decisions makers to be aware of how this project could affect your community. We encourage you to submit comments on how this project may affect you and ask that you share this information with your neighbors and invite other community members to participate in the review process.

### Scoping

"Scoping" is the process FERC uses to gathers public input and comments about a proposed natural gas pipeline project. Federal law requires FERC to seek and consider public comments as part of its decision-making process. Scoping includes a public

The staff of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC or Commission) will prepare an environmental document that will discuss the environmental impacts of the DeLa Express Project involving construction and operation of facilities by DeLa Express LLC (DeLa Express) in Reeves, Loving, Andrews, Ward, Winkler, Ector, Midland, Upton, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Mills, Hamilton, Coryell, McLennan, Falls, Bell, Robertson, Milam, Brazos, Grimes, Montgomery, Walker, San Jacinto, Liberty, Hardin, Jefferson, and Orange Counties, Texas and Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana. The Commission will use this environmental document in its decision-making process to determine whether the project is in the public convenience and necessity.

This notice announces the opening of the scoping process the Commission will use to gather input from the public and interested agencies regarding the project. As part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) review process, the Commission takes into account concerns the public may have about proposals and the environmental impacts that could result from its action whenever it considers the issuance of a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity. This gathering of public input is referred to as "scoping." The main goal of the scoping process is to focus the analysis in the environmental document on the important environmental issues. Additional information about the Commission's NEPA process is described below in the NEPA Process and Environmental Document section of this notice.

By this notice, the Commission requests public comments on the scope of issues to address in the environmental document. To ensure that your comments are timely and properly recorded, please submit your comments so that the Commission receives them in Washington, DC on or before 5:00pm Eastern Time on September 23, 2024.

### Summary of the Planned Project

DeLa Express plans to construct and operate an approximately 645.5-mile-long, 42-inch-diameter natural gas transportation mainline pipeline originating in Winkler County, Texas to a termination point in Calcasieu Parish, Louisiana. The Project would also consist of six lateral pipelines (totaling 139 miles). The DeLa Express Project would provide about 2 billion cubic feet per day of natural gas transportation from the Permian Basin in West Texas to Gulf Coast markets between Jefferson County, Texas and

The general location of the project facilities is shown in appendix 2.

### Land Requirements for Construction

Construction of the planned facilities would disturb about 12,940 acres of land for the aboveground facilities and the pipelines. Following construction, DeLa Express would maintain about 5,459 acres for permanent operation of the project's facilities; the remaining acreage would be restored. About 83 percent of the planned pipeline route parallels existing pipeline, utility, or road rights-of-way.

### NEPA Process and the Environmental Document

Any environmental document issued by Commission staff will discuss impacts that could occur as a result of the construction and operation of the planned project under the relevant general resource areas:

- geology and soils;
- water resources and wetlands;
- vegetation and wildlife;
- threatened and endangered species;
- cultural resources:
- land use:
- socioeconomics:
- environmental justice:
- air quality and noise; and
- reliability and safety.

Commission staff have already identified several issues that deserve attention based on a preliminary review of available draft reports and monthly updates provided by DeLa Express. This preliminary list of issues may change based on your comments and our analysis of final reports provided with the application for the Project:

- cumulative impacts associated with multiple adjacent pipeline easements:
- wetland and waterbody impacts:
- specialty crops and agricultural land use;
- environmental justice concerns;
- pipeline safety:
- noise and air impacts associated with compressor stations;
- impacts on existing buried utility lines;
- post-construction vegetation restoration;

comments provided under the Public Participation section of this notice. Currently, no agencies have expressed their intention to participate as a cooperating agency in the preparation of the environmental document to satisfy their NEPA responsibilities related to this project.

# Consultation Under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act

In accordance with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's implementing regulations for section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the Commission is using this notice to initiate consultation with the applicable State Historic Preservation Office(s), and to solicit their views and those of other government agencies, interested Indian tribes, and the public on the project's potential effects on historic properties.<sup>5</sup> The environmental document for this project will document our findings on the impacts on historic properties and summarize the status of consultations under section 106.

### **Environmental Mailing List**

The environmental mailing list includes federal, state, and local government representatives and agencies; elected officials; environmental justice stakeholders and public interest groups; Native American Tribes; other interested parties; and local libraries and newspapers. This list also includes all affected landowners (as defined in the Commission's regulations) who are potential right-of-way grantors, whose property may be used temporarily for project purposes, or who own homes within certain distances of aboveground facilities, and anyone who submits comments on the project and includes a mailing address with their comments. Commission staff will update the environmental mailing list as the analysis proceeds to ensure that Commission notices related to this environmental review are sent to all individuals, organizations, and government entities interested in and/or potentially affected by the planned project.

### **Session Format**



- Additional materials about FERC and the environmental review process are available at information stations at the session.


### Session Conduct

Proper conduct will help the sessions maintain a respectful atmosphere for attendees to learn about the FERC Environmental Review Process and to be able to provide comments effectively.


- Loudspeakers, lighting, oversized visual aids, or other visual or audible disturbances are not permitted.

- FERC reserves the right to end the session if disruptions interfere with the opportunity for individuals to provide oral comments or if there is a safety or security risk.




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



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# **Writing Effective Comments**

Public comments are *critical* to FERC's decision-making process. Public comments can have specific to far-reaching impacts on individuals, communities, industries, and the environment. Through comments, the public provides Commission staff information that adds important context, detail or data that can inform outcomes.

### Why Submit Comments?

FERC must make decisions related to diverse and complex aspects of the energy industry. FERC's subject matter experts – that include scientists, engineers, economists, attorneys, and others – base their analysis on relevant law, science, and economic analysis. However, because staff members are not necessarily experiencing, first-hand, the issues that they are trying to address, they need public comments to better understand an issue, perspective, problem, or potential implications of a given FERC action.

Public comments add knowledge and insight to a proceeding. Members of the public may know the land, the resources, the industry, and the stakeholders intimately and this knowledge can greatly assist the Commission during its review. Public comments strengthen Commission decisions by providing FERC with essential facts, perspectives, and data. Comments can also express support and let FERC know when it is heading in the right direction for a given issue.





### **Document Filed**

A filing is submitted to FERC. FERC opens a public record called a "docket" and assigns the filing a unique identifier called a "docket number." For policy and rulemaking proceedings, the Commission is the one to initiate the proceeding.




### Public Input Considered

Staff read and consider all comments filed by the end of the comment period before finalizing their analysis and providing recommendations for the Commission to consider and vote on.

### FERC Adopts Decisions

Finally, FERC decides on the issues before it and explains its actions. A final document called an "Order" is issued.

### **How Does FERC Use Comments?**

While the work of Commission staff is often not available to the public eye (and in some instances communications with staff may be limited by off-the-record communications rules), public comments have a significant role at FERC. The Commission may not have the resources to reply to every comment received, but every comment is recorded, read, and considered by a FERC staff member.

Further, comments often result in a number of actions and outcomes. Comments may:

- Impact a decision directly, or may spur a request to a party to provide additional information
- · Result in consultation with other federal agencies
- Raise awareness at FERC of an emerging issue or concern that may impact future proceedings

## **Top 5 Tips for Powerful Comments**

Organize Yourself

Prepare by reviewing the filing and gathering any background materials. Identify comment period deadlines and file on time. Ensure comments reference the correct docket number.

Get to Your Point

State your objective and your motivation for commenting up front.

Support Your Points

Present a concise and thorough argument, and include factual information and data, if available. Offer justifications to support your comments.

Be Specific About Impacts

Provide specific examples of how you would be impacted negatively or positively. include scientific data, charts, graphs, or maps that support these impacts. When recommending an alternative course of action, be specific about the alternative.

Understand FERC's Role

Knowing FERC's role in energy regulation will help you support your claims. As such, connect your comments to issues, factors, or impacts that are within FERC's authority. Stay within the "scope" of the proceeding and focus on issues that FERC regulates.

### How to File Comments

On FERC's website, you can find a step-by-step instruction guide that explains how the public can file comments in Commission proceedings that include natural gas pipeline, electric, and hydropower projects.

There, you can also find a recording of a workshop produced by the Office of Public Participation (OPP) on how to file comments in a FERC proceeding using FERC's eFiling and eComment online applications.

### **Building the** Administrative Record

As mentioned, a key goal of commenting is to help FERC "collect evidence." Through the information and perspectives they provide, comments ultimately aid in building a "file" that contains detailed information on a particular case or proceeding commonly referred to as an administrative record.

Along with filings made by others in the proceeding, FERC will post your comment in the administrative record. The administrative record supports informed decision-making and provides the required basis of evidence for FERC's decisions.

FERC assigns every case a unique docket number (e.g., AD21-9-000). This allows any member of the public to search for and view the most current administrative record for a proceeding, including your filed comment, by locating it online in eLibrary, FERC's online records system.

In short, comments can lead to a variety of new developments in energy regulation. The recommended course is to submit your comment on the record.

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# Natural Gas Scoping Sessions Public Participation and What to Expect

When a company seeks approval to construct and operate an interstate natural gas pipeline or liquefied natural gas (LNG) project, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) must conduct an environmental review of the proposed project's effects. Scoping Sessions are an in-person opportunity to collect public comments about a **proposed interstate natural gas project**. Public comments help FERC staff:

- · better understand community concerns
- define the scope of the environmental analysis for the proposed project
- · consider relevant factors in the environmental analysis
- make recommendations about how an applicant could avoid, mitigate, or minimize impacts on the environment from a proposed project

FERC is the host and organizer of the Scoping Sessions and strongly encourages the public to attend. During a Session, you can ask questions about the proposed project and environmental review process. Most importantly, you can provide comments about how the proposed project may affect you, your land, or your community. All comments received at Scoping Sessions are entered into FERC's administrative record called eLibrary, reviewed by FERC staff, and considered during the environmental review process.

### SCOPING SESSION FORMAT

When you attend a FERC Scoping Session, you will be greeted at a welcome table by FERC staff. At that time, staff should provide an overview of the session, direct you to a poster or handout of session rules and procedures, inquire if you are interested in project-specific mailings to stay updated on project developments, and ask if you are interested in providing comments. FERC's Office of Public Participation (OPP) staff may also attend and have their own table at the Scoping Session. Like the other members of FERC staff, OPP can provide you information and direction, with a focus on participation opportunities.

Please note that the Scoping Session will not include a formal presentation with an audience like you may see at a town hall meeting. Instead, information tables are around the room and FERC staff are available to address any of your questions about the FERC review process or the proposed project. Depending on attendance at the meeting, you may need to wait to provide comments because Scoping Sessions can sometimes be crowded.

### WHO MAY BE PRESENT AT SCOPING SESSIONS?

**FERC staff** are there to answer questions about scoping and the FERC environmental review process.

Company representatives may be present. They only provide basic information about their proposed project and do not advocate for or promote the benefits of their project.


A local police officer or private security may be present to ensure everyone's safety.

Individuals or groups advocating for or against a project may be present. They are not a formal part of the Scoping Session, and their positions are not endorsed by FERC or its staff.

Landowners, community members, and other individuals may wish to provide comments on the proposed project and scope of the environmental review.

### PROVIDING VERBAL COMMENTS

Commenting at a Scoping Session is done individually and on a first-come, first-served basis. When it is your turn to provide a verbal comment, you will be escorted by FERC staff to a room or area that is separate from the welcome area. This layout ensures privacy. First, you will be asked to provide your name and any group affiliation. Depending on the number of individuals wanting to comment, a time limit may be implemented. If a time limit is given, you will be informed and provided notice when your time is about to expire. Upon request, accommodations can be made for spouses, parents, caregivers, or support providers to accompany the commenter.



Then, a representative of FERC and a court reporter will listen to your comments. The court reporter will record and transcribe all comments. You will not be able to hear other people's comments and other people won't hear yours. Once the transcripts are finalized, FERC will post the publicly available transcripts to FERC's eLibrary of all comments received.

### PROVIDING WRITTEN COMMENTS

At some Scoping Sessions, FERC may provide a comment form for written comments at the welcome table. FERC staff treat both verbal and written comments the same way. Please choose the format that works best for you. If a form is provided, you may take it home, write your comments, and mail the form to FERC at your convenience. Comment forms or pre-prepared written comments cannot be accepted at Scoping Sessions. They must be submitted to FERC via U.S. Mail:
